CCC WARRANT ARTICLES

The CCC has submitted a warrant article for your consideration in the March elections. It reads: "To see if the

Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer the responsibility for and the management of the following town-owned properties to the Candia Conservation Commission and further, to designate these properties, in accordance with RSA 31:110, as part of the Candia Town Forest System at no cost to the Candia taxpayers."

The two parcels of land (map 406-100.1; 18 acres & 406-103.1; 20 acres), abut the southern edge of the Deerfield Road Town Forest and lie across the river from the northern edge of the old New Boston Road Recycling Center. The parcels are predominately land locked wetlands. Placing them under the supervision of the Conservation Commission will assist in the protection of the headwaters of the North Branch of the Lamprey River. It would be beneficial to add them to the Deerfield Road Town Forest and we would be able to do this without incurring any associated costs. The warrant article itself will not cost the tax payers any money. The additional acreage could allow us to expand our trail network from the Deerfield Road Town Forest parcel. We hope you will support this effort at the town elections.

August 13 was the perfect day to hold Old Home Day. It was a beautiful, sunny day. The CCC staffed a booth, which we shared with Bear-Paw Regional Greenways. .A. Note From The Chair...

We are so blessed to live in Candia. Geographically we are part of four different watersheds. A watershed is an area of land that drains into a particular body of water. In our case we supply four key rivers: Lamprey, Merrimack, Exeter, and the Suncook Rivers. The Exeter and Suncook rivers enter the Great Bay Estuary and the Lamprey and Merrimack enter the Atlantic Ocean farther south.

Natural resources are interesting; they know no political boundaries. Water that falls from the sky has two main options depending on the time of year: soaking in or running off. We have just come through quite a dry time and some, if not all of us, have had to enact water conservation efforts to ensure our access to water. Unlike most of us in Candia who depend on groundwater for our drinking and living needs, many towns farther down these watersheds rely on surface water from the rivers we send them.

The Lamprey and Merrimack rivers play an important water supply role in our geographic area. We celebrate Manchester Water Works and The Society for the Protection of NH Forests for their recent securing of funds to conserve land around Tower Hill pond. This will make an important contribution in protecting the water supply for Merrimack watershed residents for generations to come.

As a headwater source for the four rivers mentioned above, we have a special responsibly to care for the streams which begin in our town. This is one way we can be good neighbors; if the water leaving our town is clean, we are doing our part to prevent water pollution and protect the water supply for downstream towns. This requires us to consider our neighbors as we use utilize and impact our water resources and plan further development.
